

Hubert Parry (1848-1918)

I was glad (arranged by John Jermy)

The anthem *I was glad (Laetatus sum)* has been sung at every British Coronation since King Charles the First's in February 1626. Henry Purcell, William Boyce and Thomas Attwood are amongst those who have composed versions of this anthem.

Today the best known setting is that by Sir Hubert Parry, who died 100 years ago this year. Parry's composition was written for the Coronation of King Edward VII in 1902.

The text comes from five verses of Psalm 122 found in the 1662 Book of Common Prayer.

The version to be heard tonight has been arranged for brass, timpani and organ by John Jermy, the principal trumpet of Prometheus Orchestra.

Samuel Barber (1910-1981)

Sure on this shining night

Samuel Barber was one of the outstanding American composers of the 20th Century with a wide range of compositions, including orchestral, operatic, chamber and vocal music.

Barber composed over 100 works for voice and piano and this song is from his *Four Songs*, opus 13 published in 1940. The song is a beautiful setting with stylistic shades of Brahms and Schumann with a lyrical sense of line and a pulsing keyboard accompaniment.

The text of the song is taken from the first published collection of poems by James Agee (1909-1955). Educated at Harvard, Agee was an American 'man of letters'. A novelist, journalist, poet, screenwriter and film critic he was the credited screenwriter of *The African Queen* and *The Night of the Hunter*, two major films of the 1950's. His novel, *A Death in the Family*, (based on the events surrounding his father's death) was published posthumously in 1957 and the following year won the Pulitzer Prize for fiction.

Giovanni Gabrieli

(1557-1612)

Sonata Pian'e Forte arranged by Philip Jones *Canzon duodecimi toni à 10* arranged by John Jermy

Giovanni Gabrieli, an Italian composer and organist, held the important post of organist of St Mark's Basilica in Venice from 1585 until his death in 1612.

Gabrieli came from a musical family and his music represents the Venetian school of High Renaissance at its apex. Giovanni wrote a great deal of church music, much of it for two or more choirs that could take advantage of the antiphonal qualities of St Mark's acoustic.

In addition to his choral music Giovanni composed a considerable amount of instrumental music for brass instruments. This music also used the acoustics of St Marks to great advantage and you will hear this antiphonal style with two brass groups playing from opposite ends of the church in the Sonata. The Canzon and Sonata date from the end of the 16th Century.

Edward Gregson (1945-)

Make a Joyful Noise

This work was commissioned by St Dunstan's College in London, for its centenary in 1988 and first performed at the Fairfield Halls Croydon on the 28th November in that year.

Edward Gregson, as well as being a highly regarded composer, was Principal of the Royal Northern College of Music from 1996 to 2008.

Gregson's note on the score of the music reads -

'My anthem *Make a Joyful Noise* has three main sections (fast-slow-fast) and is essentially jubilant in nature. After a brief introduction the choir enters, using as its text the first two verses of Psalm 100. This reaches a climax on the word 'singing' after which the music subsides into the serene key of C major for the female voices to sing a reflective tune on the words of 'Know ye', surrounded by various counter-melodies. Male voices then take over this tune (inverted) and the final comment is left to unaccompanied choir, leaving sopranos on a held low D. At this point the last section begins. The style here takes off its hat to minimalism, with multi-layered textures underpinning the choral unisons on the word 'Enter'. Eventually the tonality heads towards G major and a reprise of the opening music, with a coda full of energetic exuberance.'

Purcell (1659-1695)

Funeral sentences for Queen Mary

Funeral March – Man that is born of a Women – Canzona – Thou Knowest Lord – Funeral March.

Henry Purcell wrote a number of Funeral sentences as well as the music for Queen Mary's funeral on15th March 1695 at Westminster Abbey.

There is some doubt as to which, and in what order, Purcell's vocal music was performed and as to when the brass and tenor drum music was employed. However the music is most fitting, moving and indeed exquisite, remaining in the repertoire of cathedrals and churches to this day.

Purcell died some eight months after Queen Mary. At his funeral, again at Westminster Abbey, this funeral music was also played.

On a personal note, 1966 marked the 900th Anniversary of the founding of Westminster Abbey. At that time I was a second year student at the Royal College of Music (RCM) with trombone as my principal study. The RCM had been invited to provide some of the music for the occasion and I found myself in the organ loft with my trumpet and trombone colleagues playing the Purcell March and Canzona to a packed Cathedral with the Queen in attendance. What an experience!

Gerald Finzi (1901-1956)

My spirit sang all day

This is a popular song, composed by Gerald Finzi in 1939 on a poem by Robert Bridges.

Recognized as one of the finest English composers of the mid 20th century Finzi's output was influenced by the fact that he lived through two World Wars and by the music of Elgar and Vaughan Williams. The song is full of life, energy and meaning.

Robert Bridges (1844-1930) was Britain's Poet Laureate from 1913 to 1930. He studied medicine at St. Bartholomew's Hospital, subsequently practising there and also at the Hospital for Sick Children. Lung disease forced him to retire in in 1882 and from then on he devoted his life to literary endeavours. He is the only medical practitioner to have held the office of Poet Laureate.

John Rutter (1945-)

Gloria

Gloria in excelsis Deo – Domine Deus – Quoniam tu solus sanctus

The *Gloria* was commissioned by the *Voices of Mel Olson* and first performed on the 5th May 1974 in Omaha, Nebraska. Although based on the Latin *Gloria*, part of the church Mass, this work was written as a concert piece. It was Rutter's first commission from the USA and has become a very popular and regularly performed work.

The work is in three movements. The first is full of life and energy –*Glory to God in the highest* with calmer passages for *and on earth peace*. The second movement has some beautifully sculpted tender music for the prayer *Thou that takest away the sins of the world have mercy upon us*.

The last movement is a joyous finale in an exciting conclusion with complex rhythmic lines for the choir and a triumphant climax – *For thou only art holy; thou only art the Lord.*

The version performed tonight is that for choir, brass, percussion and organ, as it was for the first performance.

EDMOND FIVET CBE

conductor

Edmond Fivet has been a major force in British music education, having been Director of the Royal College of Music Junior Department and serving, for eighteen years, as Principal of the Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama.

Since moving to Suffolk he has become increasingly involved in local music making, first conducting the Aldeburgh Music Club Choir in May 2007 and being appointed Director of Music of Aldeburgh Music Club in 2008. Since then Edmond has conducted some 30 concerts most of which have been at Snape Maltings. At the 2017 Aldeburgh Festival the Choir sang with the CBSO in a performance of Britten's 'The Building of the House' to mark the 50th Anniversary of the building of Snape Maltings. Repertoire has included Handel *Messiah* and *Alexander's Feast*; Mozart *Mass in C Minor, Requiem* and *Coronation Mass*; Rossini *Petite Messe Solennelle*; Walton *Belshazzar's Feast*; Haydn *Creation* and *Nelson Mass*; Fauré *Requiem*; Schubert *Mass in G* and *Mass in E flat*; Orff *Carmina Burana*; Lambert *Rio Grande*; Mendelssohn *Elijah*; Verdi *Requiem*; Bach *B minor Mass and Christmas Oratorio*; and *A Night at the Opera Gala Concert*.

2008 saw the formation of the Prometheus Orchestra, which Edmond conducts, and which has given 40 concerts in 12 venues across Suffolk. Programmes have included a range of Haydn, Mozart and Beethoven symphonies and works by Elgar, Grieg, Wagner and Schubert. The Orchestra has given a number of first performances and has championed the work of Suffolk-based composers. Prometheus Orchestra played a major part in the establishment of the William Alwyn Festival and has given a concert at each Festival since 2010.

A widely experienced adjudicator, examiner and consultant, Edmond has worked at home and overseas. Edmond was Chairman of the Bury St Edmunds Concert Club for 10 years and nationally was a trustee and board member of the National Children's Orchestras 2014-2016. From 2009-2015 he was chair of the Concert Promoters Group of Making Music.

Edmond was appointed CBE in the Queen's 2008 Birthday Honours for services to music and education.

ALDEBURGH MUSIC CLUB

Benjamin Britten founded Aldeburgh Music Club in April 1952 and its first meeting was held in Crag House, the home at that time of Britten and Peter Pears. It has become one of East Anglia's leading choral societies with over eighty members.

The season runs from September to May and the choir rehearses every Tuesday evening in order to mount three major concerts. In all these concerts the choir performs with professional soloists and orchestras and regularly appears at Snape Maltings Concert Hall as well as Orford Church. The repertoire extends to oratorio, religious music, opera and contemporary commissioned works. New members are always welcome.

Over the last three years the choir has performed works by Bach, *Mass in B Minor*, Fauré, *Requiem* and *Cantique de Jean Racine*, Handel, *Alexander's Feast* and *Messiah*, Haydn, *The Creation* and *Nelson Mass*, Rossini, *Petite Messe Solennelle* and Vivaldi, *Credo, Gloria* and *Magnificat*, as well as opera pieces.

ALDEBURGH MUSIC CLUB COMMITTEE 2017-2018

HUMPHREY BURTON CBE: Best known for his long and distinguished career in music broadcasting, Humphrey joined the BBC in 1955 and by 1965 was the first head of the new Music and Arts department. Subsequently he was a founder member of London Weekend Television as Head of Drama, Arts and Music and later edited the arts magazine *Aquarius*. He returned to the BBC in 1975 to head Music and Arts again, where he hosted *Omnibus*, inaugurated *Arena* and the long-running series *Young Musician of the Year*. For the past thirty years he has combined freelance activity as a director of televised opera and concerts with work as an impresario, broadcaster and biographer. Now a resident of Aldeburgh, Humphrey is fully involved in music, both nationally and internationally, while also being an energetic champion of amateur music through the Aldeburgh Music Club.

ROBIN LEGGATE: After studying at the Royal Northern College of Music and Snape Summer School, with Peter Pears, Robin joined the Royal Opera House, Covent Garden as a principal tenor in 1976. He sang over 900 performances there over the ensuing 35 years. He left the Opera House in 2001 to concentrate on larger roles internationally, singing many Britten operas in Europe and America. In concert he has sung most of the standard repertoire, notably Handel, Mozart, Beethoven and Britten. Robin retired to live in Suffolk in 2011.

DAME ANN MURRAY: Born in Dublin, Dame Ann studied singing from a very early age. After a period at University College Dublin, she undertook further studies with the renowned singing teacher, Frederic Cox, at The Royal Manchester College of Music. Dame Ann has sung in the great opera houses of Hamburg, Dresden, Brussels, Paris, Berlin, Cologne, Zurich, Amsterdam, the Chicago Lyric Opera, the New York Metropolitan Opera, Teatro alla Scala, Milan, the Wiener Staatsoper and the Salzburg Festival. She has particularly strong links with English National Opera, the Royal Opera House, Covent Garden and the Bayerische Staatsoper, München and is renowned for her performances in the operas of Handel, Mozart and Strauss. She was appointed an honorary Dame Commander of the British Empire in the Diamond Jubilee Honours for services to music.

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
